Dr. Steven Sandage is an Associate Professor of Marriage and Family Therapy at the Seminary. Dr. Sandage has served as clinician, psychologist, and chaplain in a variety of settings (community mental health, correctional, university) and currently engages in part-time clinical practice. Before coming to Bethel Seminary, he taught at Virginia Commonwealth University as an adjunct faculty member. He has coauthored two books: *To Forgive Is Human* (with Michael McCullough and Everett Worthington) and *The Faces of Forgiveness: Searching for Wholeness and Salvation* (with LeRon Shults). His other primary areas of writing and research include marriage and family therapy, virtue ethics and moral development, the integration of theology and social science, postmodern culture, and healthy community.
